Local Rock Shop Rolls with the Changes

hen Dick's Rock Shop lost its original owners within two years of each other, it looked like the end of the then 25-year-old establishment. But with some encouragement from customers and lots of help from her friends, Diana Wing, a relative of the owners, decided to keep the business going. Two years later, the little shop on highway 85/87 just north of Highway 16 is still rocking.

Richard Stearns of Minnesota had retired from the US Army and had been introduced to stone-cut-

ting and jewelry making by Cecile Burghard, the aunt of his Colorado-native wife, Flossie Wing Stearns. Richard had a knack for the hobby, and Cecile encouraged him



to turn it into a career. Cecile and Richard opened a lapidary shop and gift store in August of 1978. Flossie quit her account-

Get to know a CSMS Lifetime Member

he first thing you notice when you visit Vern Campbell's home is that rocks are everywhere. Befitting a true rockhound, rocks line walkways, tables, shelves, cabinets and virtually every available spot without and within Vern's house. And, reflecting the precision and exactitude that he displayed in his career as a journeyman tool and model maker, virtually every rock is labeled, organized and/or grouped. A 30-year member of CSMS, who was sponsored by one of the club's past presidents, Vern's rock

collection features a great deal of agate and petrified wood, much of which is cut and polished with many rare and unusual pieces. Through the years, he also developed lapidary and silversmithing skills and learned to make jewelry.

In an occurrence that perhaps would prove prophetic of Vern's work with tools, toolmaking and machinery, Vern was born three blocks from the John Deere tractor plant in Waterloo, Iowa in 1923 and even worked for John

ing job to work with them handling the books and working in the store. Cecile did jewelry making, stone cutting and silversmithing while Dick used his skills for repairing, designing and creating pieces of jewelry from rocks and gemstones found on rock hounding trips and from folks who brought them in from all over the world. They enjoyed all the people they encountered as clients, business associates, rock hounds, jewelry-makers, sculptors, crafters and artists.

The venture proved to be more than just a career. Through the business they made many life-long friends. The Stearns became active members within the community and in less than 10 years Dick became the president of the Colorado Springs Mineralogical Society.

Illness overcame Dick and he passed away in the summer of 2000. Flossie's sister, Diana Wing, an accountant with some background in the gold, silver and jewelry business, moved from Aurora to Security to help out. She began to learn the lapidary business under Flossie's guidance, attended trade shows and met vendors, artists and tradesmen. The on-the-job training was going very well when Flossie died unexpectedly in the spring of 2002.

Diana was shaken and unsure of her ability to carry on the family business. Friends and customers convinced her to give it a shot. Long time family friends Yolanda Conway, Kitty Smith and

Dick Stearns was President of Colorado Springs Mineralogical Society in 1986 and 1987. Dick and Flossie became members of CSMS in March 1979.

DICK'S ROCK SHOP has been a paying advertiser in the PICK and PACK for three decades. Dick and Flossie were great supporters of CSMS and participated in many annual Gem and Mineral Shows.

They also were very active in introducing the youth of the area to minerals by holding open house for students of surrounding schools. Diana Wing continues to provide this learning experience. CSMS was/is lucky to have such involved and giving supporters. - Dorothy Atlee, CSMS member

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Deere for a brief time. Vern's fascination with machines may have started when he was forced to ride a bicycle two miles to grade school (undoubtedly up hill both ways!). By the time he reached junior high, he was already building things like scooters and bike trailers. During high school at the Teacher's College on the campus of the University of Nebraska at Lincoln, he built what he calls a "midget motorcycle" from a cut-down 1917 Harley and worked at a machine and welding shop for the grand sum of five cents an hour! Following graduation in 1940, he briefly attended the University of Nebraska where he studied engineering, but was forced to leave to help his grandfather run his farm near Waterloo, rebuilding the engine of a 1928 Indian motorcycle in order to have the wheels to get there.

On September 6, 1945, Vern married Mae Qual, the love of his life, left the farm and ultimately did a stint in the Navy where

he worked as an Aviation Electronics Technician Mate-aka "striker." Thereafter, he bounced around for a while, working at an iron foundry, machine shop, as a welder, Ford salesman, and house framer until he landed at the Chamberlain Corporation in Iowa for several years. There he served as an experimental mechanic, where, though he worked mostly in the civilian division, among other things he made "jumping mines" and recoilless artillery shells. (He still has a shell in his home, along with a lot of other WWII-era equipment, including an oscilloscope and a never-used B-29 battery charger with instruction manual!) He and Mae then moved to Manitou Springs, arriving "the day of the deepest fall snowstorm in Colorado Springs history," September 29, 1959. Once here. Vern went to work as a tool and dye maker for Aircraft Mechanics, Inc., where he remained for the next 28 years until he retired. AMI specialized in mak-

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ing crew seats for airplanes, and during his time there Vern was involved in creating seats for the F-106 (ejection), the DC-10, missile silos, the B-1 bomber and the Space Shuttle. Earning a reputation for precision and accuracy, Vern made and assembled the prototypes

for all new products.

In addition to providing him a solid vocation, working at Aircraft Mechanics, Inc. co-

incidentally led to Vern's avocation as a rockhound and CSMS member. After buying a trailer that could be pulled by their '57 Ford upon moving to Manitou, Vern and Mae would take fishing trips to local lakes, where he started picking up rocks along the shorelines. However, in what was undoubtedly the beginning of his love for petrified wood, he also worked with AMI employees who invited him to collect the material on their ranch property near Calhan. Then, in 1974 Vern was encouraged to join the CSMS—and sponsored—by past club president, Bill Kronke, who was an engineer with AMI. (In addition to Mr. Kronke, among other notable, former club members, Vern mentions that he also knew George and Betty Fisher who owned a local amazonite

mine.) Through CSMS Vern learned to cut and polish rocks and the lapidary skills necessary to make jewelry. He even had his own home small business for several years, making belt buckles, necklaces and earrings, especially out of agates and petrified wood.

Vern still has samples of his jewelry at his home which he's happy to show. But, of course, he has a tremendous collection of petrified wood, including some beautiful pieces from Calhan, Parker, Oregon, Idaho, Montana, Wyoming and Alaska. He's got black and white wood from Parker, "wormy" wood from Calhan and some spectacular Blue Forest pieces, including some root specimens, in addition to Eden Valley and Big Sandy Reservoir wood. In fact, Vern describes the Blue

Forest as his best-ever collecting place. He also mentions Hartsel as a good place for agate and wood and has a very unusual, redmarbled agate from that locale. If you go to Vern's house, he may also show you some of the tools he has made, as well as the two second-owner cars he and Mae owned. Both are restored trophy winners. One is a 1959 Oldsmobile 98 ScenicCoupe Vern has maintained in prime condition since buying it in '62. The other is a 1961 T-bird, two-door, hardtop previously owned by the wife of a Brigadier General at NORAD that Vern bought in '69.

On a sad note, Vern just lost his wife of 58 years last November, after happily providing the 24/7 care Mae required in their home for the last 15 months, three weeks of her life. Retrieving her from a care center, where she wasn't getting the best of assistance and realizing that it wouldn't be an easy time, they established only one house rule: they would never raise their voices to each other. Vern broke this rule only once the first time Mae spilled water on the table, due to severe arthritis in her hands which made it almost impossible for her to hold a glass. Many spills followed, which were thereafter met with

knowing glances and gentle laughter. According to Vern, "It was one of the best times of our lives." Vern has two daughters, one who lives in Colorado Springs and the other in Ketchikan, Alaska, where he also has two grandsons.

Also, a member of the Gold Prospectors of Colorado, Vern can be seen at regular CSMS meetings and at the Lapidary Group, where he's usually on the "big wheel," grinding or polishing some fantastic piece of petrified wood. You can't miss him—he's the guy in the tam-o'-shanter and suspenders, likely wearing samples of the lovely bolo ties, belt buckles, watchbands or bracelets he was made.

A Mammoth Find in Florissant

During the last Ice Age the mighty mammoth roamed the hills and valleys of Florissant, Colorado. Eleven thousand years ago they vanished from the face of the earth. Join a park ranger and Steven Veatch, a local geologist, as they reveal the exciting discovery of a mammoth that has been buried in the ground near the Florissant Fossil Beds National Monument Visitor Center for at least 49,000 years. This discovery represents a relatively high elevation for mammoths and is the first documented mammoth in Teller County.



Presentation: The Map that Changed the World - By Steve Willman

In 1815 William Smith published the world's first geological map. The map defined the underground structure of all of Great Britain. Smith had worked completely alone and largely in secret on this map for 15 years. He was the first to define the theory of succession of layers and the first to recognize and use index fossils.

Smith was a canal builder working near Bath, England in the late 1700s. His work there led him to uncover the precepts of modern geology. Smith's ideas were a brave departure from the then pervasive beliefs that the earth was only a few thousand years old and that fossils were remnants of the great flood.

Smith's story is told in the book "The Map that Changed the World" by Simon Winchester. The book captured my imagination. It led me to England to search for his canal and visit the countryside where his ideas were born. My program will follow Smith's story and describe my own search through the English countryside.
